

The numbers 11 are black in color, while the black 4 has fallen off leaving the shadow of a 4 visible. 114 Lake Avenue is located on the southwest corner of the intersection of Lake Avenue and Dewey Avenue in Bristol, Connecticut. The search will include the curtilage, outbuildings, and common areas

And that the facts establishing the grounds for issuing a Search and Seizure Warrant are the following:

1. That the Affiant, Detective Garrie Dorman, is a sworn member of the Bristol Police Department currently assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division with over 18 years experience as a Police Officer. That the Co-Affiant, Detective Peter Dauphinais, is a sworn member of the Bristol Police Department currently assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division with over 19 years experience as a Police Officer. The information contained within this affidavit was provided to the Affiants by sworn Police Officers from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts who have personal knowledge of the facts and circumstances related below as the result of their own investigative efforts and those of other police officers who have reported their findings to them.
2. That on Monday, June 17, 2013, at approximately 5:37 p.m., the North Attleboro (Massachusetts) Police Department responded to a cellular 911 call reporting a dead body in the area of 344 John L. Dietsch Boulevard in North Attleboro. The North Attleboro Police Department responded to a secluded area in the area of 344 John L. Dietsch Boulevard in North Attleboro, Massachusetts and located a deceased male lying supine on the ground. The initial responding police officers observed several injuries to the upper torso area of the then unidentified deceased black male. The initial responding officers further observed blood in these areas. The injuries appeared to have been caused by a firearm. The area where the deceased black male individual was found is remotely located and used as a processing area for construction materials such as dirt, gravel, stone, asphalt, and fill. The police did not observe any vehicles at the location where the black male individual was found deceased. The police conducted a search of the body of the deceased black male individual during the processing of the crime scene on Monday, June 17, 2013. The police observed that the pants pockets of the deceased male individual appeared to be undisturbed. A wallet containing a Massachusetts Drivers License bearing the name Odin L. Lloyd (DOB: 11/14/1985) of 10 Fayston Street, Apt. # 2 in Boston inside the right rear pants pocket of the deceased black male. The photograph on Mr. Lloyd's Massachusetts Driver's License matched the general physical appearance of the deceased male individual.
3. That on the night of Monday, June 17, 2013, officers traveled to Mr. Lloyd's residential address of 10 Fayston Street in Boston, MA in order to attempt to make a death notification to his next of kin. Officers notified Mr. Lloyd's next of kin and interviewed some of his friends and family members upon their arrival at 10 Fayston Street in Boston on the night of Monday, June 17, 2013. Officers interviewed Mr. Lloyd's sister, Shaquilla Thibou, following the death notification. Shaquilla Thibou indicated that she lived with Mr. Lloyd at 10 Fayston Street, Apt. #2, in Boston. Shaquilla Thibou further indicated that she last saw Mr. Lloyd at or between 1:00 to 2:00 a.m. in front of 10 Fayston Street in Boston. Shaquilla Thibou went on to indicate that Mr. Lloyd entered a silver, four-door car with three other males whose identities she did not know. Shaquilla Thibou indicated that the silver vehicle and the occupants left the area after Mr. Lloyd entered the vehicle. Shaquilla Thibou told investigators that she had never seen this silver car before. Shaquilla Thibou further indicated Mr. Lloyd was dating a woman named Shaneah. Shaquilla Thibou explained that Shaneah was the sister of New England

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Patriots player Aaron Hernandez's girlfriend, Shayanna Jenkins. Shaquilla Thibou stated that, other than Aaron Hernandez (DOB: and Shayanna Jenkins, she did not know of any other contacts that Mr. Lloyd had in the North Attleboro area. Shaquilla Thibou showed investigators some of the text messages that her brother had sent to her after he entered the silver vehicle on the early morning of Monday, June 17, 2013. Investigators reviewed the text messages on Mr. Lloyd's cell phone and observed that he had contact with his sister, Shaquilla Thibou, and other individuals in the hours before his death. Investigators viewed that Mr. Lloyd had communication with two telephone numbers, which investigators were later able to identify as belonging to Mr. Hernandez and Ernest Wallace in the hours before his death.

4. That Investigators spoke to Mr. Lloyd's girlfriend, Shaneah, and learned that her sister, Shayanna Jenkins, was dating Mr. Hernandez. Investigators spoke to Shayanna Jenkins, and confirmed that she was in a long term relationship with Mr. Hernandez and obtained his cell phone number. The number for Mr. Hernandez provided to investigators by Shayanna Jenkins matched the number found in Mr. Lloyd's cell phone. Several text messages were exchanged between Mr. Lloyd and Mr. Hernandez on June 17, 2013. The earlier text conversations indicated that Mr. Hernandez wanted to meet up with Mr. Lloyd. Investigators were able to gather surveillance video from the 10 Fayston Street, Boston neighborhood. Investigators viewed the video and observed that at 2:32 AM on June 17, 2013; a gray Nissan Altima is seen pulling up to the outside of Mr. Lloyd's house. Mr. Lloyd is seen entering the vehicle and the Nissan Altima is then seen leaving the area. Investigators determined that Nissan Altima, Massachusetts Registration 536MX2, belonged to Enterprise Rental Company and was rented out of the North Attleboro Enterprise branch by Mr. Hernandez.

5. That Investigators visited Mr. Hernandez' home at 22 Ronald C. Meyer Drive in North Attleboro, Massachusetts and made contact with Mr. Hernandez. Mr. Hernandez confirmed that he rented a vehicle for his friend "O." Investigators determined that Mr. Hernandez had rented a Chevrolet Suburban and a Nissan Altima. During the visit, Investigators observed several cameras affixed to the exterior of the home. A search warrant was executed at Mr. Hernandez's residence of 22 Ronald C. Meyer Drive in North Attleboro and the home's video surveillance storage system was seized. Investigators viewed the stored surveillance video footage and observed that in the early morning hours of June 17, 2013, Mr. Hernandez and two other males were observed exiting the home and getting into a Nissan Altima. The Altima was then seen leaving the home. Still photographs of the frontal views of Mr. Hernandez and the other two males were taken from the surveillance footage. Surveillance video footage then shows the Nissan Altima returning to the home about 2 ½ hours later. Mr. Hernandez and the two other males are seen exiting the vehicle and entering the home. The video footage

shows Mr. Hernandez and the other two males holding what appears to be a handgun. The video footage then shows the three inside holding the handgun as well.

6. That it is important to note that investigators obtained video footage showing the Nissan Altima visiting a service station in Canton, Massachusetts around 2:10 AM on June 17, 2013. Two of the three males (including Mr. Hernandez) were observed exiting the vehicle and purchasing items in the service station convenience store. One of the males has what appears to be a white towel draped around his neck. Investigators took custody of the Nissan Altima (which was returned to Enterprise Rental Car in North Attleboro), obtained a search warrant and search the vehicle for evidence related to Mr. Lloyd's death.

7. That Investigators learned that Bristol, Connecticut was Mr. Hernandez' home town. Contact was made with personnel from the Bristol (Connecticut) Police department. Investigators provided the Bristol, CT police with information related to Mr. Hernandez and the other two males. The males were tentatively identified as Ernest Wallace (DOB: 1/28/1972) and Carlos Ortiz (DOB: 1/15/1986). Investigators confirmed Mr. Wallace and Mr. Ortiz's identity through pictures and other investigative knowledge. Investigators also learned that Mr. Wallace and Mr. Ortiz were known to the Bristol Police detectives. It was also learned that Mr. Ortiz was on active probation through the State of Connecticut.

8. That Investigators learned that Mr. Ortiz was scheduled to meet with his probation officer on Tuesday, June 25, 2013. Investigators made arrangements to be present for the probation meeting at the Office of Adult Probation, 225 North Main St, Bristol, CT. At the meeting, investigators made contact with Mr. Ortiz and interviewed him. Prior to the interview, Mr. Ortiz was given his Miranda warnings and informed investigators that he wished to speak with them about events that occurred in Massachusetts. The interview was audio and video recorded and is preserved on DVD media. Mr. Ortiz explained that he was friends with Mr. Hernandez and Mr. Wallace. He stated that he was at 114 Lake Avenue, Bristol, CT on June 16, 2013 with Mr. Wallace. Mr. Ortiz explained that Mr. Wallace communicated with Mr. Hernandez and plans were made for the two to visit Mr. Hernandez at his residence of 22 Ronald C. Meyer Drive, North Attleboro, Massachusetts.

9. That Mr. Ortiz stated that he and Mr. Wallace drove to Mr. Hernandez' residence in North Attleboro that evening. According to video surveillance footage, Mr. Ortiz and Mr. Wallace arrived to 22 Ronald C. Meyer Drive just after midnight on June 17, 2013. He explained when he and Mr. Wallace arrived, Mr. Hernandez and his girlfriend (Shayanna Jenkins) were not home. Mr. Ortiz added that Mr. Hernandez' babysitter let the two access into the home. He added that while in Mr. Hernandez' residence, he observed a small and large handgun in the home. Mr. Ortiz explained that Mr. Hernandez and his girlfriend arrived home soon after with Mr. Hernandez carrying a handgun.

10. That Mr. Ortiz explained that he, Mr. Wallace and Mr. Hernandez left the residence in a Nissan Altima. Video surveillance shows the Nissan Altima leaving the residence at around 1:09 AM on June 17, 2013. Mr. Ortiz stated that he was unfamiliar with the area and that after a long drive, the group stopped at a service station for gas and other items. Surveillance video at the Blue Hills Service Station in Canton, MA, identify that the Nissan Altima arrived to the service station just after 2:00 AM. Surveillance video footage identifies Mr. Hernandez and Mr. Ortiz exiting the Nissan Altima, entering the service station's convenience store and purchasing items. The vehicle is then observed exiting the service station.

11. That Mr. Ortiz stated that some time later, the group picked up a fourth individual, identified as Odin Lloyd, at his residence. After picking up Mr. Lloyd, Mr. Ortiz stated that the group then traveled back to North Attleboro. Mr. Ortiz explained that during the drive back to North Attleboro, he overheard Mr. Hernandez state directly to Mr. Lloyd that he [Mr. Lloyd] was "chilling" with people that he [Mr. Hernandez] had problems with. Mr. Ortiz explained that Mr. Hernandez and Mr. Lloyd made up by "shaking hands" and added that "it" was squashed.

12. That Mr.

Ortiz explained that the group returned to North Attleboro. Mr.

Ortiz added that he fell asleep on the ride back. He stated that he awoke when the vehicle stopped and observed Mr. Hernandez, Mr. Wallace and Mr. Lloyd exit the vehicle to urinate. Mr. Ortiz explained that he then heard gunshots. He added that Mr. Hernandez and Mr. Wallace got back into the vehicle without Mr. Lloyd and the vehicle fled. He stated that he was unable to determine who had fired the gunshots because of the darkness. Mr. Ortiz explained that minutes later, the group arrived at 22 Ronald C. Meyer Drive (Mr. Hernandez' residence). Mr. Ortiz explained that at the residence, as he was exiting the vehicle, Mr. Hernandez asked him to take possession of the small gun that was located under the rear of the driver's seat of the vehicle. Mr. Ortiz stated that he exited the vehicle with a small handgun (carrying it in his right hand) and gave the handgun to Mr. Hernandez once inside the residence. Mr. Ortiz explained that he then went to sleep.

13. That Mr. Ortiz stated that when he awoke that afternoon, he, Mr. Hernandez and Mr. Wallace drove the Nissan Altima back to the Enterprise Rental company in North Attleboro and returned the vehicle. He added that the group then picked up a 2012 Chrysler 300. Mr. Ortiz stated that the group traveled back to 22 Ronald C. Meyer Drive, dropped off Mr. Hernandez and traveled a short distance to an unknown apartment in the North Attleboro area. Mr. Ortiz explained that the apartment was used by Mr. Hernandez and other football players. Upon arrival at the apartment, Mr. Ortiz stated that Mr. Wallace unlocked the door and let him into the apartment. Mr. Ortiz stated that Mr. Wallace drove off but he [Mr. Ortiz] remained at the apartment. Mr. Ortiz explained that Mr. Wallace returned to the apartment after a long interval of time. Mr. Ortiz added that he and Mr. Wallace then returned to 114 Lake Avenue in Bristol, CT in the Chrysler 300. Mr. Ortiz stated that Mr.

Wallace told him that Mr. Hernandez admitted to shooting Mr. Lloyd. Mr. Ortiz explained that Mr. Wallace left in the Chrysler 300 while he [Mr. Ortiz] remained at 114 Lake Avenue.

14. That during the interview, Mr. Ortiz stated that he resided at both 78 Federal Street, Apartment #6, Bristol, CT and 114 Lake Avenue, Bristol, CT.

15. That it is important to note that investigators have not located the firearm that is consistent with the injuries to Mr. Lloyd.

16. That based on video evidence, statements made by Mr. Ortiz during his interview with police on June 25, 2013, and other information, investigators believe that Mr. Hernandez, Mr. Wallace and Mr. Ortiz were present during the murder of Odin Lloyd on or around June 17, 2013. Due to the fact that Mr. Ortiz admitted to returning to 114 Lake Avenue, Bristol, CT after the homicide and also residing at 78 Federal Street, Apartment #6, Bristol, CT, investigators believe that evidence related to the murder of Odin Lloyd exists at the aforementioned residences.

17. That the Affiants are aware, based upon my experience and training, that crimes of violence often involve a struggle and the use of weapons or other instrumentalities. I also know that the person or persons participating in the commission of a violent offense are in contact with the physical surroundings and often leave evidence or trace evidence that if collected will help to identify the perpetrators and / or the nature of the crime. I am aware that there is often an attempt to alter, destroy, remove, clean up, or cover up evidence of a crime. I am aware that evidence of a crime may be left in the form of gunshot residue, clothing, footwear, physiological fluids, palm prints, shoe prints, fibers, fingerprints, footprints, tire tread impressions, hair, saliva, semen, blood, firearms, pistols, revolvers, rifles, shotguns, ammunition, shell casings, projectiles, hatchets, axes, cutting instruments, knife and / or knives, cellular telephones, pieces of identification in print, photograph, or video that may identify any or all of the parties named in the investigation. I am also aware that many of these items are minute and/or microscopic, and are often referred to as trace and biological evidence and that specialized training and equipment is needed for the collection of such trace and biological evidence.

18. That the Affiants are also aware that victims, witnesses and suspects commonly communicate using cellular devices and or a computers prior to, during and after a crime(s) is committed. I am aware that cellular devices, computers and any onboard storage media, contain information such as the dates/times of phone calls sent and received as well as contact lists, text messages, pictures, videos, maps, internet data, etc. In light of the information gathered by investigators, I have probable cause to believe that any mobile devices and or computers present at the aforementioned addresses may contain additional information related to the murder of Odin Lloyd; including but not limited to call or communication logs, SMS or text messages, MMS or multimedia

messages, voicemail information, photographs, videos, internet search data, social networking data, and other data that is relevant to the investigation.

19. That the Affiants are aware that specialized equipment may be necessary in order for investigators to successfully collect some of the aforementioned evidence. The Affiants are also aware that personnel specializing in the recovery of this evidence may be necessary to assist with the investigation.

20. That the Affiants are also aware that the perpetrator of a violent crime may remove evidence from the scene and conceal it or destroy it in an attempt to secrete it from investigators.

Often a perpetrator will return to his or her residence and discard items that he or she may not view as evidence. Such items could be clothing.

Often perpetrators will return to his or her residence to change clothing in an attempt to alter his or her appearance. I am also aware that a perpetrator may leave evidence of a crime at his or her residence prior to the commission of that crime. This could include evidence that the perpetrator was in possession of a firearm or ammunition and may be stored in his or her residence. I request permission to video record and photograph the residence described in this affidavit.

21. That the Affiants also have personal knowledge, based upon their experience and training, that a crime scene, such as described above, will contain physical evidence, hereinbefore itemized, which will aid in establishing the identity of the perpetrator(s), the circumstances under which the crime was committed, and/or which in general will assist in the discovery of the pertinent facts and that such evidence requires a systematic search to locate, seize, record and process. That trace evidence left in the forms mentioned above is easily transferred between participants and inanimate objects such as surroundings, including their home or motor vehicle. That it is reasonable to believe and expect that a person responsible for committing a crime, such as the one described in this affidavit, would come in contact with these forms of trace evidence and transfer them to their surroundings.

22. That the Affiants also have personal knowledge that the Massachusetts State Police Crime Lab located in Lakeville, Massachusetts has the equipment, personnel and expertise necessary to conduct physical examination, scientific testing and forensic analysis, including but not limited to biological and chemical testing, instrumental analysis, firearms, photography, biochemistry, DNA, criminalistics, fingerprints, in order to locate, identify, compare and reconstruct items of evidence and trace evidence to aid in establishing the circumstances of the crime and identity of the participants involved in the crime. The Massachusetts State Police crime Lab will use standardized and documented procedures to extract, amplify and detect DNA from evidentiary items and

samples taken from known individuals. The resulting DNA profiles from the evidentiary items will be compared to the known individuals' profiles and the results documented in a laboratory report.

23. That based upon the facts and circumstances described above, the Affiants have probable cause to believe that evidence of the crime of murder, in violation of Connecticut General Statute 53a-54a and Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 265, Section 1, will be found within 114 Lake Avenue, Bristol, Connecticut, to include the curtilage, outbuildings, and common areas. Therefore, the Affiants are requesting a Search and Seizure Warrant be issued for 114 Lake Avenue, Bristol, Connecticut for evidence related to the murder of Odin Lloyd. This evidence includes but is not limited to rental car paperwork, gunshot residue, clothing, footwear, towels, physiological fluids, palm prints, shoe prints, fibers, fingerprints, footprints, tire tread impressions, hair, saliva, blood, firearms, pistols, revolvers, rifles, shotguns, ammunition, shell casings, projectiles, pieces of identification in print, photograph, or video, cellular devices, computers, and digital storage devices.

At the conclusion of the pre-test phase of the polygraph examination, the examiner discussed and thoroughly reviewed the pertinent case facts and all the test questions with the examinee. The purpose of this detailed review is to provide the examinee an opportunity to ensure he or she completely understands the questions before the onset of the testing phase of the examination.

Section 3: In-Test Phase

A Lafayette computerized polygraph system, model LX4000 was used for the collection of polygraph tests (test data). This instrument makes a continuous recording of autonomic responses associated with respiration, electrodermal activity, and cardiovascular functioning. The instrument also includes sensors designed to record peripheral behavior activity and cooperation during the examination. The following pertinent questions were asked during the polygraph examination and Carlos Ortiz answered "No" to these questions.

- 5 R: Did you shoot "O"?
- 7 R: Did you shoot "O" that day?
- 10 R: Do you get out of the car when "O" was shot?

Section 4: Result

A total of 3 charts were collected. I analyzed and scored this polygraph exam as "Deception Indicated".

Section 5: Post-Test Interview

A post-test interview was conducted. Carlos Ortiz was informed of my findings. During this interview Carlos Ortiz made the following admissions or changes to his original story:

- Original statement was when the shooting took place he was sleeping in the back seat. He now admits he was awake and talking to "Bo" when he heard the shots fired. He also adds that he did open the door to get out of the car from left rear passenger seat, but never actually stepped foot to the ground before he heard the shots.
- He states that from the darkness he could not see Aaron Hernandez shoot "O", but immediately after the shots he saw Aaron Hernandez running with a black gun by himself from the area of where the shots were fired and "O" did not come back.

There were several other inconsistencies that were changed from the original statement which may prove pertinent to this investigation. Ortiz also answered numerous very specific questions with vague, non-specific answers, which, based on my training and experience, is an indication that he has more relevant information regarding this investigation. And that the facts establishing the grounds for issuing a Search and Seizure Warrant are that

1. That the Affiant, Detective Garrie Dorman, is a sworn member of the Bristol Police Department currently assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division with over 18 years experience as a Police Officer. That the Co-Affiant, Detective Peter Dauphinais, is a sworn member of the Bristol Police Department currently assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division with over 19 years experience as a Police Officer. The information contained within this affidavit was provided to the Affiants by sworn Police Officers from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts who have personal knowledge of the facts and circumstances related below as the result of their own investigative efforts and those of other police officers who have reported their findings to them.

2.) That, Paul A. MacIsaac is a police officer for the City of Boston and has been a police officer for over twenty five years. That Detective MacIsaac reported that on July 16, 2012, at about 2:32 AM, officers from Districts D-4 and A-1 responded to a radio call for two people shot and one hurt at the intersection of Shawmut Avenue and Herald Street in Boston. Upon arrival, Boston Police officers observed a 2003 gray BMW 325XI with Massachusetts Registration 453-RP3, VIN- WBAEU33453PM52349 registered to Neusa Abreu of 4 Wendover Street, Dorchester located at the intersection of Shawmut Avenue and Herald Street with the engine running. Located inside the vehicle was a black male seated in the driver's seat suffering from a gunshot wound to the chest. This victim was later identified as Daniel Abreu, DOB: 08/25/82. Also located in the vehicle was another black male seated in the front passenger seat suffering from a gunshot wound to the head. This victim was later identified as Safiro Teixeira Furtado, DOB: 11/10/83. Both victims were pronounced deceased on scene by Boston Health and Hospitals Emergency Medical Personnel. A third shooting victim, identified as Aquilino Freire, DOB: 11/24/86, was located at the scene and suffering from a non-life threatening gunshot wound to each arm. Mr. Freire was transported by emergency personnel to Tufts Medical Center for treatment.

3.) That Detective MacIsaac initially responded to Tufts Medical Center to interview Aquilino Freire. Mr. Freire stated that on Sunday night, July 15, he and his friends went to Cure, a night club located at 246 Tremont Street in Boston, MA. He stated that they went to the club in the BMW 325XI. When asked to describe the shooting as it occurred, Mr. Freire indicated that he was sitting in the rear middle of the car, with Gerson Lopes to his left and Raychides Sanches to his right. He stated that Daniel Abreu was driving and the front seat passenger was Safiro Furtado. Mr. Freire stated that just prior to the shooting, they were stopped at the light at the intersection of Shawmut Avenue and another street (determined to be Herald Street), waiting to take a left to go home, when a car he described as an SUV pulled up along the right side at the intersection. Mr. Freire stated that he glanced over at the SUV and saw a driver and a rear passenger in the vehicle. Mr. Freire stated that he saw the rear passenger laughing and did not pay much attention to the vehicle. Mr. Freire stated that suddenly, several shots were fired from the rear passenger area of the SUV into the car he and his friends were in. After the shooting stopped, Mr. Freire got out of the vehicle and attempted to talk to the front seat passenger (Safiro Furtado), but he received no response. Raychides Sanches and Gerson Lopes, ran from the area. Mr. Freire stated that he was extremely upset and walked around attempting to stop other vehicles to get help. Upon responding to the scene, Detective MacIsaac observed the two bodies of the victims seated in the BMW with sheets draped over their bodies. The two rear doors of the vehicle were open and the left rear passenger door window was shattered, with glass on the street. The right rear passenger door window was in the down position. The front passenger door window was also in the down position. The keys to the vehicle were on the windshield by the left windshield wiper. Detective MacIsaac observed reddish brown stains on the right rear quarter panel of the vehicle and a trail of reddish brown stains on the street leading away and around the vehicle. The Boston Police Crime Scene Response Unit responded to the scene, photographed the vehicle and the scene, and took swabs of the reddish brown stains that were located on the street. The BMW 325XI Massachusetts Registration 453-RP3 containing the victims' bodies was towed to Boston Police Headquarters and secured in the motor vehicle bay pending the issuance of a search warrant.

4.) That, on July 16, 2012, Sergeant Detective Marc Sullivan and Detective MacIsaac executed an un-numbered Boston Municipal Court search warrant on Massachusetts Registration 453-RP3 the BMW 325 XI at Boston Police Headquarters. The two deceased victims were removed from the vehicle and transported to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner for autopsies. That on July 17, 2012, the two deceased victims were identified as Daniel Abreu DOB: 08/25/82 and Safiro Furtado DOB: 10/11/83. Doctor Katherine Lindstrom of the Medical Examiner's office performed autopsies on the victims and determined that the cause of death was gunshot wounds and the manner of death to be homicide. An analysis of ballistics evidence recovered suggests that one unrecovered revolver capable of firing .38 caliber or .357 caliber bullets was used.

5.) That, on July 16, 2012, a passenger in the victim vehicle identified as Raychides Sanches DOB: 06/22/82 responded to the Boston Police Department Homicide Unit for an interview. This interview was conducted by Sergeant Detective Marc Sullivan and Detective Joshua Cummings. This interview was recorded with Mr. Sanches's knowledge. During the interview Mr. Sanches stated that on July 15, into July 16, he went to the Cure night club with his friends Gerson (Gerson Lopes), Safiro (Safiro Furtado), Aquilino Freire, who he calls "Delmar", and "white boy," referring to Daniel Abreu. Daniel Abreu drove the BMW to the club. Mr. Sanches stated that they parked in the garage and had no trouble with anyone while in the garage. Mr. Sanches stated that he and Gerson waited on the street level while the others went into the garage to get the car. Mr. Sanches stated that as they were leaving the area in the vehicle, they stopped at a stoplight on the bridge

Mr. Lopes stated that he went to a club, though he could not remember the name of the club, with Raychides, (Raychides Sanchez), Delmar (Aquilino Freire), Daniel (Daniel Abreu) and Safiro (Safiro Furtado). Daniel drove them all to the club. Mr. Lopes stated that as he entered the club, he had his ID scanned and that they stayed at the club for about two hours. Mr. Lopes stated that the club closed and they left the club. Mr. Lopes stated that there was no trouble in the club that he noticed. They left the club and went to the garage to get the car. Mr. Lopes stated that he and Raychides stayed on the street level while the others went into the garage to get the car. A short time later, the BMW exited the garage and Mr. Lopes and Raychides entered the BMW and left to go home.

Mr. Lopes stated that they stopped at a light on the bridge when a car pulled up on their right. Mr. Lopes stated that he heard the shooter say "nigger" and heard Safiro say "why" in Creole. The shooter then started shooting at them in the car, firing about five shots. After the shooting Mr. Lopes got out of the car and tried to get help. Mr. Lopes stated that he saw a car, got scared, and left the scene. Mr. Lopes described the shooter as a white male, no accent, American, wearing a hat that may have been green, no facial hair, and in his twenties.

Mr. Lopes stated that the suspect car took a left towards the highway. Mr. Lopes described the suspect car as either a silver or gray Toyota Highlander.

8.) That, on July 19, 2012, Donald Gobin DOB: 07/15/63, responded to the Boston Police Homicide Unit for an interview. Mr. Gobin worked security for Chris Harris Promotions. Mr. Gobin stated that he was working at a nearby club on the night of July 15 into July 16, 2012. Mr. Gobin was on his way home to Rhode Island driving with his co-worker Brian Quon. Mr. Gobin stopped at the red light at Shawmut Avenue and Marginal Street, when a vehicle pulled up next to them on the right. Mr. Gobin describes this vehicle as either a silver Nissan Pathfinder or a silver Toyota 4-Runner. Mr. Gobin described the driver of the vehicle as a light skinned Hispanic male with short dark hair. Mr. Gobin stated that the SUV ran the red light on Shawmut Avenue, which drew his

attention. Mr. Gobin looked at the plate of the vehicle and noticed that the SUV Gobin is from Rhode Island and the plates were familiar to him. Mr. Gobin observed the SUV pull up to the next intersection at Shawmut Avenue and Herald Street to the right of a BMW. Mr. Gobin heard six gunshots in rapid succession coming from the SUV over a span of eight to ten seconds. The SUV then pulled away rapidly, taking a left onto Herald Street. Mr. Gobin pulled up to the BMW and saw glass on the street and observed two males get out of the back of the car onto the street and checked themselves for injuries. One of the males was yelling for help, and Mr. Gobin saw what he believed to be blood on the BMW and two additional males in the front seats not moving. Mr. Gobin called 911 and continued on his way home.

9.) That, on July 19, 2012, Brian Quon, DOB: 08/14/63, responded to the Boston Police Homicide Unit for an interview. Mr. Quon also worked security for Chris Harris Promotions, and was working at the same bar as Mr. Gobin the night of July 15 into July 16, 2012. Mr.

Quon stated that he was on his way home to Rhode Island with his co-worker Donald Gobin, who was driving. They stopped at a red light at Marginal Street and Shawmut Avenue. While stopped at the light, he observed a gray SUV that Mr. Quon thought was a Nissan Pathfinder stopped next to them at the red light. Mr. Quon describes the driver of the SUV as a black male or dark skin Hispanic male with short hair. The passenger had braids that may have had beads and Mr. Quon was unsure if that person was a male or female. Mr. Quon stated that this SUV ran the red light and went straight on Shawmut Avenue. About ten seconds went by and Mr. Quon heard six rapid gun shots. Mr. Quon looked up and saw the SUV turning left onto Herald Street. Mr. Quon stated that Mr. Gobin pulled up to the BMW and Mr. Quon saw two guys on the street checking themselves, and broken glass on the street. As they got closer Mr. Quon could see two additional males in the front seats who appeared to be shot. Mr. Quon stated that Mr. Gobin called 911 and then they went home to Rhode Island.

10.) That, a video canvas was done of the surrounding area of Tremont Street. Video footage was recovered from the Cure night club located at 246 Tremont Street, Boston, the Tufts Medical Center and garage located at 274 Tremont Street, Boston, and other locations that recorded digital images in relevant areas. A review of the video footage allowed detectives to track the victims' movements to and from Cure and captured them leaving the parking garage just prior to the shooting. However, there was no video footage that captured the shooting. Attempts to positively identify the suspect vehicle were also unsuccessful.

11.) That, Boston Police requested assistance from the public in locating a light colored SUV with Rhode Island plates. Detectives also investigated various motor vehicles listed in the Rhode Island Registry of Motor Vehicles that generally fit the description of the suspect car. None of these efforts were successful in identifying the suspect vehicle or the perpetrator(s). The initial investigation also did not reveal any clear motive for the shooting. On or about June 19, 2013, Boston Police homicide detectives assigned to this investigation became aware, through news accounts, of a homicide investigation in North Attleboro involving New England Patriots

professional football player Aaron Hernandez as a possible suspect. Specific accounts detailed the shooting murder of 27 year-old Odin Lloyd, a resident of Dorchester, whose body was recovered in an industrial area near the home of Hernandez. At this time, detectives recalled that in previously viewing the video footage from Club Cure on the morning of July 16, 2012, an individual, clearly recognized as Aaron Hernandez is observed entering the club at approximately the same time as the victims. It should be noted that Aaron Hernandez is a 23 year-old white Hispanic male with short dark hair and was clearly recognizable to Detective MacIsaac.

12.) That, with this information, Boston Police Detectives contacted Massachusetts State Police Detectives assigned to the Lloyd homicide investigation to determine if there could be a connection between the two incidents. State Police detectives later advised detectives investigating the Abreu/Furtado homicide that on June 22, 2013, an anonymous caller contacted North Attleboro Police stating that he had knowledge that the two incidents (the Lloyd homicide and the July 16, 2012 Abreu/Furtado homicide) were related. The phone call with this anonymous tip was recorded, and provided to Detective MacIsaac. In the recording (recorded on June 22, 2013, at approximately 16:27 hours), the male caller stated that he wanted to provide information about a double murder in Boston and wanted to remain anonymous. This male stated that on July 16, 2012, at about 2:30 in the morning, there was a double murder in the South End near the turnpike between areas A-1 and D-4. This male stated that an SUV with Rhode Island plates was involved and that this murder is related to the ongoing homicide investigation in North Attleboro. When asked by the dispatcher if he had information that the "person of interest" in the North Attleboro homicide was also involved in the South End double homicide, the caller responded in the affirmative. This male was asked by the dispatcher how he knows this information and the male replied "someone accidentally spilled the beans in front of me." The level of detail provided by the caller about the date, time, and location of the double homicide, along with the Rhode Island plates, strongly suggests that this caller has specific knowledge of the incident. The North Attleboro incident he is referring to is clearly the murder investigation of Odin Lloyd, in which Aaron Hernandez is a suspect.

13.) That, as a result of this information, a detailed analysis of the video surveillance was undertaken, with specific attention to the movements of Aaron Hernandez ("Hernandez") on the morning of July 16, 2012. Video surveillance from the Tufts parking garage shows Hernandez arrive at 12:04 A.M., driving a silver 2006 Toyota 4Runner, with a clearly visible license plate, 635035. The license plate is white with blue lettering, consistent with a Rhode Island plate.

14.) That, Hernandez is next observed with an unknown light-skinned Hispanic male in front of Cure at approximately 12:30 A.M. He enters the club immediately after the victims (Furtado, Abreu, Sanchez, Freire, Lopes). Hernandez and the same unknown Hispanic male go downstairs in the club where cameras did not record, and leave approximately 10 minutes later, with Hernandez quickly consuming two drinks before exiting.

Hernandez is observed in color video surveillance footage to be wearing a gray t-shirt with a red design on the front, a gray t-shirt with a red, green and blue design on the front, one beaded necklace, and a set of rosary beads with a cross and a round medallion, both necklaces appear to be black or dark colored, and a pair of gray and white sneakers.

15.) That, Hernandez and the unknown Hispanic male are next observed on video crossing Tremont Street. At 1:05 A.M., Hernandez and the unknown Hispanic male are seen on video coming back across Tremont Street towards the parking garage. They enter the garage at 1:07 AM. Hernandez and the unknown Hispanic male are next observed leaving the garage in the same silver Toyota 4 Runner at 1:17:21 AM. Aaron Hernandez is observed driving this vehicle and the unknown Hispanic male is observed in the front passenger seat.

16.) That, the victims in this incident are observed on the Cure Night Club surveillance footage leaving the club at 2:10:27. The victims walk to the garage at 274 Tremont Street (the same garage where Hernandez and the unknown Hispanic male were seen exiting). On the Tufts garage surveillance footage, the victims can also be seen walking on Tremont Street towards the garage. The footage shows that as the victims are walking on the sidewalk of Tremont Street, what appears to be a silver Toyota 4 Runner (consistent with the vehicle Hernandez was operating) can be seen traveling in the left hand lane closest to the sidewalk, going by the victims at 2:17:56 AM. The Toyota 4 Runner can be seen traveling on Tremont Street and taking a right hand turn onto Tremont Street at Shawmut Avenue. Gerson Lopes and Raychides Sanchez are observed on video waiting on the sidewalk outside the garage when what appears to be the same silver Toyota 4 Runner is observed again traveling on Tremont Street in the middle lane at 2:20:59 AM, passing Mr. Lopes and Mr. Sanchez at a slow rate of speed. Other traffic is passing the Toyota 4 Runner due to its decreased speed. The Toyota 4 Runner appears to take the same right hand turn onto Tremont Street at Shawmut Avenue, as if looping the block.

17.) That, this silver Toyota 4 Runner is also captured on the Cure night club video which points out onto Tremont Street at Stuart Street. The Toyota 4 Runner is observed coming off Stuart Street taking a right hand turn onto Tremont Street. The two loops around the block by the Toyota 4 Runner near club Cure and the parking garage are captured on two separate video surveillance systems. The silver Toyota 4 Runner with Rhode Island Registration 635035, in which Hernandez was observed operating in the area of the homicides on July 16, 2012, was run in the RMV database by detectives. This vehicle is registered to Jana Leasing and Rental Corporation, of 415 Taunton Avenue, E. Providence RI 02914. This vehicle is a 2006 Toyota 4 Runner VIN-JTEBU17R768052996, silver in color. On June 26, 2013, Sergeant Detective Marc Sullivan and Detective Joshua Cummings responded to Jana Leasing and Rental Corporation at 415 Taunton Avenue in E. Providence RI, d/b/a Fox Toyota, to locate and photograph the Toyota 4 Runner, and to gather any rental information for the vehicle in and around the time of the homicides on July 16, 2012. Upon their arrival they spoke with Kevin Walton, the General Manager of Fox Toyota. Walton stated that the Toyota 4 Runner in question is a demo

model and was given to Aaron Hernandez in 2012 for him to use in exchange for promotions for the company. Mr. Walton stated that they have contacted Aaron Hernandez' agent for the 603630 Toyota 4 Runner back. Mr. Walton stated they have not heard back and they are unaware of the vehicle's present location. This information was later confirmed by Mr. Jack Fox the owner of Fox Toyota. Mr. Fox informed detectives that he last saw the vehicle in question with Hernandez in May of 2012, but had not seen the vehicle since that time. Additionally, he indicated that the vehicle had not been brought in for routine servicing and maintenance since May 2012.

18.) That, Massachusetts State Police Detectives investigating the homicide of Odin Lloyd, which resulted in murder and related firearm charges against Aaron Hernandez, advised Boston detectives that their investigation also revealed Hernandez frequently rented cars from a particular Enterprise Rental Agency. A review of rental records from Enterprise reveals that Hernandez rented a vehicle on July 17, 2012, the day after the Abreu and Furtado murders.

19.) That, Detective MacIsaac was advised that on June 26, 2013, Massachusetts State Trooper Jeremiah Donovan, assigned to the State Police Detective Unit of the Bristol County District Attorney's Office assisted in the execution of a search warrant at 114 Lake Avenue in Bristol, Connecticut, a residence linked to Hernandez. During this search, the silver Toyota 4 Runner with Rhode Island plates 635035 was located in the locked garage at this residence. A resident of 114 Lake Avenue, a Jennifer Valderrama, stated that the vehicle belongs to Aaron Hernandez and it was given to him when he signed for some promotions deal. She additionally stated that Hernandez left the vehicle there about a year ago. When asked if anyone drives the vehicle, Ms. Valderrama stated no. Trooper Donovan stated that a key for the vehicle was produced by a male occupant of that house from a coat pocket in a clothes storage area in the basement. Trooper Donovan stated that the Toyota 4 Runner has a layer of dust and cob webs on it. Trooper Donovan also stated that the battery was dead. Trooper Donovan informed Detective MacIsaac that there is a bag of clothing in an upstairs bedroom with Aaron Hernandez' name on the bag.

20.

) That, based on the foregoing facts and information the affiant believes that there is probable cause to believe that Aaron Hernandez, had under his control on July 16, 2012 a 2006 Toyota 4 Runner silver in color with Rhode Island registration 635035 in an area around the area of Tremont Street in Boston.

21.) That, based upon the detailed anonymous tip connecting Hernandez, witness descriptions of the suspect car used in the July 16, 2012 homicides (specifically the fact that it was described as a silver 4 Runner or Pathfinder with a Rhode Island license plate), and two descriptions of the driver as a light skinned or white male with a baseball hat, there is also probable cause to believe that Aaron Hernandez was operating the suspect

That the affiant believes that there is also probable cause to believe that at the time of the shooting, Hernandez was wearing a gray baseball hat with a red or orange brim on top, with a red or orange design on the front, a gray tee shirt with a red, green and white design on the front, one pair of gray and white sneakers, a beaded necklace, and a set of rosary beads with a round medallion and a cross. That the affiant is aware from his training and experience that persons who discharge, or are near those who discharge firearms may have what is referred to as gunshot residue deposited on their clothing. This residue can be also be deposited and/or transferred to other surfaces, such as the interior of a vehicle from which a firearm was discharged.

23.) That, the Toyota 4 Runner is currently secured by the Bristol Connecticut Police Department in the garage at 114 Lake Avenue in Bristol, Connecticut. There is probable cause to believe that this vehicle may contain evidence relative to the investigation into the murder of Daniel Abreu and Safiro Furtado. In their training and experience of the affiants are aware that people leave latent print evidence from coming into contact with surfaces they touch. It is also the affiant's experience that people leave personal papers and or items in their own motor vehicles or motor vehicles they ride in. 


AFFIDAVIT

In Support of Application for Search Warrant

Now comes the affiant who swears to the following: My name is Paul A. MacIsaac. I am a police officer for the City of Boston. I have been a police officer for over twenty five years. I have been a detective since 1998. Prior to my current assignment, I was assigned to Area C-11, covering the Dorchester section of the city of Boston. In that capacity, I was involved in the processing of hundreds of crime scenes involving violent felonies. In 2010, I was assigned to the Homicide Unit. As a homicide detective, I have been involved in dozens of death investigations. I have completed a five week investigations training seminar from the Boston Police Academy. I have attended a Crime Scene Investigations seminar from the Henry C. Lee Institute of Forensic Science, which included training in the processing and collection of evidence. I have also attended the Practical Homicide Investigation seminar provided by P.H.I. Investigative Consultants Inc. I hold a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Anna Maria College. The information contained within this affidavit is based on my own observations, observations of other sworn members of the Boston Police Department, and information from witnesses interviewed by me or by other members of the Boston Police Department, or other law enforcement agencies.

Based upon my personal knowledge I believe that the crime of murder, a violation of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 265, Section 1, was committed at the intersection of Shawmut Avenue and Herald Street in Boston, Massachusetts on July 16, 2012. The facts establishing the grounds for my request to the court for the issuance of a search warrant are as follows:

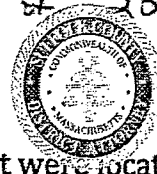
On July 16, 2012, at about 2:32 AM, officers from Districts D-4 and A-1 responded to a radio call for two people shot and one hurt at the intersection of Shawmut Avenue and Herald Street in Boston. Upon arrival, Boston Police officers observed a 2003 gray BMW 325XI with Massachusetts Registration 453-RP3, VIN-WBAEU33453PM52349 registered to Neusa Abreu of 4 Wendover Street, Dorchester located at the intersection of Shawmut Avenue and Herald Street with the engine running. Located inside the vehicle was a black male seated in the driver's seat suffering from a gunshot wound to the chest. This victim was later identified as Daniel Abreu, DOB: 08/25/82. Also located in the vehicle was another black male seated in the front passenger seat suffering from a gunshot wound to the



head. This victim was later identified as Safiro Texeira Furtado, DOB: 11/10/83. Both victims were pronounced deceased on scene by Boston Health and Hospitals Emergency Medical Personnel. A third shooting victim, identified as Aquilino Freire, DOB: 11/24/86, was located at the scene and suffering from a non-life threatening gunshot wound to each arm. Mr. Freire was transported by emergency personnel to Tufts Medical Center for treatment.

This affiant initially responded to Tufts Medical Center to interview Aquilino Freire. Mr. Freire stated that on Sunday night, July 15, he and his friends went to Cure, a night club located at 246 Tremont Street in Boston, MA. He stated that they went to the club in the BMW 325XI. When asked to describe the shooting as it occurred, Mr. Freire indicated that he was sitting in the rear middle of the car, with Gerson Lopes to his left and Raychides Sanches to his right. He stated that Daniel Abreu was driving and the front seat passenger was Safiro Furtado. Mr. Freire stated that just prior to the shooting, they were stopped at the light at the intersection of Shawmut Avenue and another street (determined to be Herald Street), waiting to take a left to go home, when a car he described as an SUV pulled up along the right side at the intersection. Mr. Freire stated that he glanced over at the SUV and saw a driver and a rear passenger in the vehicle. Mr. Freire stated that he saw the rear passenger laughing and did not pay much attention to the vehicle. Mr. Freire stated that suddenly, several shots were fired from the rear passenger area of the SUV into the car he and his friends were in. After the shooting stopped, Mr. Freire got out of the vehicle and attempted to talk to the front seat passenger (Safiro Furtado), but he received no response. According to Mr. Freire, the two remaining rear seat passengers, Raychides Sanches and Gerson Lopes, ran from the area. Mr. Freire stated that he was extremely upset and walked around attempting to stop other vehicles to get help.

Upon responding to the scene, this affiant observed the two bodies of the victims seated in the BMW with sheets draped over their bodies. The two rear doors of the vehicle were open and the left rear passenger door window was shattered, with glass on the street. The right rear passenger door window was in the down position. The front passenger door window was also in the down position. The keys to the vehicle were on the windshield by the left windshield wiper. This affiant observed reddish brown stains on the right rear quarter panel of the vehicle and a trail of reddish brown stains on the street leading away and around the vehicle. The Boston Police Crime Scene Response Unit responded to the scene, photographed the vehicle



and the scene, and took swabs of the reddish brown stains that were located on the street. The BMW 325XI Massachusetts Registration 453-RP3 containing the victims' bodies was towed to Boston Police Headquarters and secured in the motor vehicle bay pending the issuance of a search warrant.

On July 16, 2012, Sergeant Detective Marc Sullivan and this affiant executed an un-numbered Boston Municipal Court search warrant on Massachusetts Registration 453-RP3 the BMW 325 XI at Boston Police Headquarters. The two deceased victims were removed from the vehicle and transported to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner for autopsies.

On July 17, 2012, the two deceased victims were identified as Daniel Abreu DOB: 08/25/82 and Safiro Furtado DOB: 10/11/83. Doctor Katherine Lindstrom of the Medical Examiner's office performed autopsies on the victims and determined that the cause of death was gunshot wounds and the manner of death to be homicide. An analysis of ballistics evidence recovered suggests that one revolver capable of firing .38 caliber or .357 caliber bullets was used.

On July 16, 2012, a passenger in the victim vehicle identified as Raychides Sanches DOB: 06/22/82 responded to the Homicide Unit for an interview. This interview was conducted by Sergeant Detective Marc Sullivan and Detective Joshua Cummings. This interview was recorded with Mr. Sanches's knowledge. During the interview Mr. Sanches stated that on July 15, into July 16, he went to the Cure night club with his friends Gerson (Gerson Lopes), Safiro (Safiro Furtado), Aquilino Freire, who he calls "Delmar", and "white boy," referring to Daniel Abreu. Daniel Abreu drove the BMW to the club. Mr. Sanches stated that they parked in the garage and had no trouble with anyone while in the garage. They walked to the club, and while at the club, they had no trouble that he knew of.

Mr. Sanches stated that after the club closed, they all walked to the garage to get the car. Mr. Sanches stated that he and Gerson waited on the street level while the others went into the garage to get the car. A short time later the victims' car left the garage and Mr. Sanches and Gerson entered the vehicle and they drove away.

Mr. Sanches stated that as they were leaving the area in the vehicle, they stopped at a stoplight on the bridge (Shawmut Avenue and Herald Street). Mr. Sanches stated that a car pulled up next to them on the right, and he heard someone from that car say "nigger" with an American accent. Mr. Sanches described the driver of



the car as a white guy with a white hat or a white design on the hat, wearing, early twenties, clean face, and he had a big black gun. Mr. Sanches stated that he could see another person in the front passenger seat but was unsure if that person was a male or a female. Mr. Sanches described the car as a Toyota Highlander with two colors. He described one of the colors as being the color of the blinds in the interview room at the Homicide Unit, which are beige. Mr. Sanches stated that he heard about six shots fired at the car. After the shooting, Mr. Sanches fled from the scene.

On July 16, 2012, another passenger that was in the BMW identified as Gerson Lopes DOB: 01/03/88, responded to the Homicide Unit for an interview. This interview was conducted by Sergeant Detective Marc Sullivan and Detective Joshua Cummings and was recorded with Mr. Lopes' knowledge.

Mr. Lopes stated that he went to a club, though he could not remember the name of the club, with Raychides, (Raychides Sanchez), Delmar (Aquilino Freire), Daniel (Daniel Abreu) and Safiro (Safiro Furtado). Daniel drove them all to the club. Mr. Lopes stated that as he entered the club, he had his ID scanned and that they stayed at the club for about two hours. Mr. Lopes stated that the club closed and they left the club. Mr. Lopes stated that there was no trouble in the club that he noticed. They left the club and went to the garage to get the car. Mr. Lopes stated that he and Raychides stayed on the street level while the others went into the garage to get the car. A short time later, the BMW exited the garage and Mr. Lopes and Raychides entered the BMW and left to go home.

Mr. Lopes stated that they stopped at a light on the bridge when a car pulled up on their right. Mr. Lopes stated that he heard the shooter say "nigger" and heard Safiro say "why" in Creole. The shooter then started shooting at them in the car, firing about five shots. After the shooting Mr. Lopes got out of the car and tried to get help. Mr. Lopes stated that he saw a car, got scared, and left the scene.

Mr. Lopes described the shooter as a white male, no accent, American, wearing a hat that may have been green, no facial hair, and in his twenties.

Mr. Lopes stated that the suspect car took a left towards the highway. Mr. Lopes described the suspect car as either a silver or gray Toyota Highlander.

On July 19, 2012, Donald Gobin DOB: 07/15/63, responded to the Homicide Unit for an interview. Mr. Gobin worked security for Chris Harris Promotions. Mr.



Gobin stated that he was working at a nearby club on the night of July 15 into July 16, 2012. Mr. Gobin was on his way home to Rhode Island driving with his co-worker Brian Quon. Mr. Gobin stopped at the red light at Shawmut Avenue and Marginal Street, when a vehicle pulled up next to them on the right. Mr. Gobin describes this vehicle as either a silver Nissan Pathfinder or a silver Toyota 4-Runner. Mr. Gobin described the driver of the vehicle as a light skinned Hispanic male with short dark hair.

Mr. Gobin stated that the SUV ran the red light on Shawmut Avenue, which drew his attention. Mr. Gobin looked at the plate of the vehicle and noticed that the SUV had Rhode Island plates. Mr. Gobin is from Rhode Island and the plates were familiar to him.

Mr. Gobin observed this SUV pull up to the next intersection at Shawmut Avenue and Herald Street to the right of a BMW. Mr. Gobin heard six gunshots in rapid succession coming from the SUV over a span of eight to ten seconds. The SUV then pulled away rapidly, taking a left onto Herald Street. Mr. Gobin pulled up to the BMW and saw glass on the street and observed two males get out of the back of the car onto the street and checked themselves for injuries. One of the males was yelling for help, and Mr. Gobin saw what he believed to be blood on the BMW and two additional males in the front seats not moving. Mr. Gobin called 911 and continued on his way home.

On July 19, 2012, Brian Quon, DOB: 08/14/63, responded to the Homicide Unit for an interview. Mr. Quon also worked security for Chris Harris Promotions, and was working at the same bar as Mr. Gobin the night of July 15 into July 16, 2012.

Mr. Quon stated that he was on his way home to Rhode Island with his co-worker Donald Gobin, who was driving. They stopped at a red light at Marginal Street and Shawmut Avenue. While stopped at the light, he observed a gray SUV that Mr. Quon thought was a Nissan Pathfinder stopped next to them at the red light. Mr. Quon describes the driver of the SUV as a black male or dark skin Hispanic male with short hair. The passenger had braids that may have had beads and Mr. Quon was unsure if that person was a male or female.

Mr. Quon stated that this SUV ran the red light and went straight on Shawmut Avenue. About ten seconds went by and Mr. Quon heard six rapid gun shots. Mr. Quon looked up and saw the SUV turning left onto Herald Street. Mr. Quon stated



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that Mr. Gobin pulled up to the BMW and Mr. Quon saw two guys on the street checking themselves, and broken glass on the street. As they got closer Mr. Quon could see two additional males in the front seats who appeared to be shot. Mr. Quon stated that Mr. Gobin called 911 and then they went home to Rhode Island.

A video canvas was done of the area surrounding Tremont Street. Video footage was recovered from the Cure night club located at 246 Tremont Street, Boston, the Tufts Medical Center and garage located at 274 Tremont Street, Boston, and other locations that recorded digital images in relevant areas. A review of the video footage allowed detectives to track the victims' movements to and from Cure and captured them leaving the parking garage just prior to the shooting. However, there was no video footage that captured the shooting. Attempts to positively identify the suspect vehicle were also unsuccessful.

Boston Police requested assistance from the public in locating a light colored SUV with Rhode Island plates. Detectives also investigated various motor vehicles listed in the Rhode Island Registry of Motor Vehicles that generally fit the description of the suspect car. None of these efforts were successful in identifying the suspect vehicle or the perpetrator(s). The initial investigation also did not reveal any clear motive for the shooting. On or about June 19, 2013, Boston Police homicide detectives assigned to this investigation became aware, through news accounts, of a homicide investigation in North Attleboro involving New England Patriots professional football player Aaron Hernandez as a possible suspect. Specifically, media accounts detailed the shooting murder of 27 year-old Odin Lloyd, a resident of Dorchester, whose body was discovered in an industrial area near the home of Hernandez. At this time, detectives recalled that in previously viewing the video footage from Club Cure on the morning of July 16, 2012, an individual, clearly recognized as Aaron Hernandez is observed entering the club at approximately the same time as the victims. It should be noted that Aaron Hernandez is a 23 year-old white Hispanic male with short dark hair and was clearly recognizable to this affiant. With this information, detectives contacted Massachusetts State Police detectives assigned to the Lloyd homicide investigation to determine if there could be a connection between the two incidents. State Police detectives later advised detectives investigating the Abreu/Furtado homicide that on June 22, 2013, an anonymous caller contacted North Attleboro Police stating that he had knowledge that the two incidents (the Lloyd homicide and the July 16, 2012 Abreu/Furtado homicide) were related. The phone call with this anonymous tip was recorded, and



provided to this affiant. In the recording (recorded on June 22, 2010, at approximately 16:27 hours), the male caller stated that he wanted to provide information about a double murder in Boston and wanted to remain anonymous. This male stated that on July 16, 2012, at about 2:30 in the morning, there was a double murder in the South End near the turnpike between areas A-1 and D-4. This male stated that an SUV with Rhode Island plates was involved and that this murder is related to the ongoing homicide investigation in North Attleboro. When asked by the dispatcher if he had information that the "person of interest" in the North Attleboro homicide was also involved in the South End double homicide, the caller responded in the affirmative. This male was asked by the dispatcher how he knows this information and the male replied "someone accidentally spilled the beans in front of me." The level of detail provided by the caller about the date, time, and location of the double homicide, along with the Rhode Island plates, strongly suggests that this caller has specific knowledge of the incident. The North Attleboro incident he is referring to is clearly the murder investigation of Odin Lloyd, in which Aaron Hernandez is a suspect.

As a result of this information, a detailed analysis of the video surveillance was undertaken, with specific attention to the movements of Aaron Hernandez ("Hernandez") on the morning of July 16, 2012. Video surveillance from the Tufts parking garage shows Hernandez arrive at 12:04 A.M., driving a silver 2006 Toyota 4Runner, with a clearly visible license plate, 635035. The license plate is white with blue lettering, consistent with a Rhode Island plate.

Hernandez is next observed with an unknown light-skinned Hispanic male in front of Cure at approximately 12:30 A.M. He enters the club immediately after the victims (Furtado, Abreu, Sanchez, Freire, Lopes). Hernandez and the same unknown Hispanic male go downstairs in the club where cameras did not record, and leave approximately 10 minutes later, with Hernandez quickly consuming two drinks before exiting. Hernandez is observed in color video surveillance footage to be wearing a gray baseball hat with a red/orange brim on the top, and a red design on the front, a gray t-shirt with a red, green and white design on the front, one beaded necklace, and a set of rosary beads with a cross and a round medallion, both necklaces appear to be black or dark colored, and a pair of gray and white sneakers.

Hernandez and the unknown Hispanic male are next observed on video crossing Tremont Street. At 1:05 A.M., Hernandez and the unknown Hispanic male are seen on video coming back across Tremont Street towards the parking garage. They



enter the garage at 1:07 AM. Hernandez and the unknown Hispanic male are next observed leaving the garage in the same silver Toyota 4 Runner at 1:17:21 AM. Aaron Hernandez is observed driving this vehicle and the unknown Hispanic male is observed in the front passenger seat.

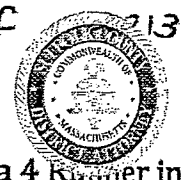
The victims in this incident are observed on the Cure Night Club surveillance footage leaving the club at 2:10:27. The victims walk to the garage at 274 Tremont Street (the same garage where Hernandez and the unknown Hispanic male were seen exiting). On the Tufts garage surveillance footage, the victims can also be seen walking on Tremont Street towards the garage. The footage shows that as the victims are walking on the sidewalk of Tremont Street, what appears to be a silver Toyota 4 Runner (consistent with the vehicle Hernandez was operating) can be seen traveling in the left hand lane closest to the sidewalk, going by the victims at 2:17:56 AM. The Toyota 4 Runner can be seen traveling on Tremont Street and taking a right hand turn onto Tremont Street at Shawmut Avenue. Gerson Lopes and Raychides Sanchez are observed on video waiting on the sidewalk outside the garage when what appears to be the same silver Toyota 4 Runner is observed again traveling on Tremont Street in the middle lane at 2:20:59 AM, passing Mr. Lopes and Mr. Sanchez at a slow rate of speed. Other traffic is passing the Toyota 4 Runner due to its decreased speed. The Toyota 4 Runner appears to take the same right hand turn onto Tremont Street at Shawmut Avenue, as if looping the block.

This silver Toyota 4 Runner is also captured on the Cure night club video which points out onto Tremont Street at Stuart Street. The Toyota 4 Runner is observed coming off Stuart Street taking a right hand turn onto Tremont Street. The two loops around the block by the Toyota 4 Runner near club Cure and the parking garage are captured on two separate video surveillance systems.

The silver Toyota 4 Runner with Rhode Island Registration 635035, in which Hernandez was observed operating in the area of the homicides on July 16, 2012, was run in the RMV database by detectives. This vehicle is registered to Jana Leasing and Rental Corporation, of 415 Taunton Avenue, E. Providence RI 02914. This vehicle is a 2006 Toyota 4 Runner VIN-JTEBU17R768052996, silver in color. On June 26, 2013, Sergeant Detective Marc Sullivan and Detective Joshua Cummings responded to Jana Leasing and Rental Corporation at 415 Taunton Avenue in E. Providence RI, d/b/a Fox Toyota, to locate and photograph the Toyota 4 Runner, and to gather any rental information for the vehicle in and around the time of the homicides on July 16, 2012. Upon their arrival they spoke with Kevin Walton, the

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General Manager of Fox Toyota. Walton stated that the Toyota 4 Runner in question is a demo model and was given to Aaron Hernandez in 2012 for him to use in exchange for doing promotions for the company. Mr. Walton stated that they have contacted Aaron Hernandez' agent to get the Toyota 4 Runner back. Mr. Walton stated they have not heard back and they are unaware of the vehicle's present location. This information was later confirmed by Mr. Jack Fox the owner of Fox Toyota. Mr. Fox informed detectives that he last saw the vehicle in question with Hernandez in May of 2012, but had not seen the vehicle since that time. Additionally, he indicated that the vehicle had not been brought in for routine servicing and maintenance since May 2012.

Massachusetts State Police Detectives investigating the homicide of Odin Lloyd, which resulted in murder and related firearm charges against Aaron Hernandez, advised Boston detectives that their investigation also revealed Hernandez frequently rented cars from a particular Enterprise Rental Agency. A review of rental records from Enterprise reveals that Hernandez rented a vehicle on July 17, 2012, the day after the Abreu and Furtado murders.

This affiant was advised that on June 26, 2013, Massachusetts State Trooper Jeremiah Donovan, assigned to the State Police Detective Unit of the Bristol County District Attorney's Office executed a search warrant at 114 Lake Avenue in Bristol, Connecticut, a residence linked to Hernandez. During this search, the silver Toyota 4 Runner with Rhode Island plates 635035 was located in the locked garage at this residence. A resident of 114 Lake Avenue, a Jennifer Valderrama, stated that the vehicle belongs to Aaron Hernandez and it was given to him when he signed for some promotions deal. She additionally stated that Hernandez left the vehicle there about a year ago. When asked if anyone drives the vehicle, Ms. Valderrama stated no. Trooper Donovan stated that a key for the vehicle was produced by a male occupant of that house from a coat pocket in a clothes storage area in the basement. Trooper Donovan stated that the Toyota 4 Runner has a layer of dust and cob webs on it. Trooper Donovan also stated that the battery was dead. Trooper Donovan informed this affiant that there is a bag of clothing in an upstairs bedroom with Aaron Hernandez' name on the bag.

Information received from the Massachusetts State Police revealed that on June 21, 2013, Trooper Joshua Winters responded to a radio call for a motor vehicle accident on I-91 in Longmeadow, Massachusetts. One of the vehicles involved in the accident, a red 2012 Toyota Camry, CT Reg. 529ZPH, was being operated by Jailene



Diaz-Ramos. That vehicle was towed and inventoried. During the inventory, State Police located an unlocked briefcase in the trunk of the vehicle that contained an unloaded Smith & Wesson .38 caliber special revolver, serial number 212682, along with three loose rounds. Following the recovery of the weapon, Ms. Diaz-Ramos was interviewed (post-Miranda) by State Police. She stated that a few days ago, she gave a ride to a friend named, "Chicago" and his "buddies." She stated that they are football players and they put all of their belongings in the trunk of her car. She further stated that she later removed their belongings from her trunk and left them outside of her house, but she now believes that one of "Chicago's" friends must have left the case containing the gun in her trunk without her knowledge. Ms. Diaz-Ramos lives at 95 Carolina Road in Bristol, Connecticut.

On June 28, 2013, Boston Police homicide detectives obtained test fired projectiles from the .38 caliber revolver recovered from the car of Ms. Diaz-Ramos. The test fires were provided by the Massachusetts State Police Ballistics Unit in Springfield. On June 28, 2013, Detective Tyrone Camper of the Boston Police Firearms Analysis Unit received the test fired projectiles. That same day, Detective Camper conducted a microscopic examination and comparison analysis of the test fired projectiles to the projectiles recovered from the July 16, 2012 homicides of Daniel Abreu and Safiro Furtado. According to Detective Camper, the test fired projectiles from the .38 caliber revolver found in the car of Ms. Diaz-Ramos are consistent to a reasonable degree of ballistic certainty with the bullets recovered from the July 16, 2012 homicides of Daniel Abreu and Safiro Furtado.

This affiant has been advised by Detective Dorman of the Bristol (CT) Police Department that "Chicago" is known to him as John Alcorn (DOB: 4/30/92) of 275 Sonstorm Road, Bristol, Connecticut. This address is the family address of T.L. Singleton. T.L. Singleton is the husband of Tonya Cummings of 114 Lake Avenue, Bristol, Connecticut. According to Detective Dorman, Tonya Cummings is the cousin of Aaron Hernandez. 114 Lake Avenue is the address from which the 2006 Toyota 4 Runner silver in color with Rhode Island plate 635035, VIN-JTEBU17R768052996 was found secreted in the garage.

Based on the foregoing facts and information this affiant believes that there is probable cause to believe that Aaron Hernandez, had under his control on July 16, 2012 a 2006 Toyota 4 Runner silver in color with Rhode Island registration 635035 in an around the area of Tremont Street in Boston.



Based upon the detailed anonymous tip connecting Hernandez, witness descriptions of the suspect car used in the July 16, 2012 homicides (specifically the fact that it was described as a silver 4 Runner or Pathfinder with a Rhode Island license plate), two descriptions of the driver as a light skinned or white male with a baseball hat, and the recovery of the firearm used in the murder with a connection to Aaron Hernandez, there is also probable cause to believe that Aaron Hernandez was operating the suspect vehicle used in the shooting homicides of Daniel Abreu and Safiro Furtado, and may have been the shooter.

This affiant believes that there is also probable cause to believe that at the time of the shooting, Hernandez was wearing a gray baseball hat with a red or orange brim on top, with a red or orange design on the front, a gray tee shirt with a red, green and white design on the front, one pair of gray and white sneakers, a beaded necklace, and a set of rosary beads with a round medallion and a cross. This affiant is aware from training and experience that persons who discharge, or are near those who discharge firearms may have what is referred to as gunshot residue deposited on their clothing. This residue can be also be deposited and/or transferred to other surfaces, such as the interior of a vehicle from which a firearm was discharged.

Detectives assigned to this investigation have been further advised by Massachusetts State Police detectives investigating the Odin Lloyd murder that the primary residence of Aaron Hernandez is 22 Ronald C. Meyer Drive, North Attleboro, Massachusetts. That residence has already been the subject of multiple search warrant executions leading to the recovery of evidence, including a firearm. On June 27, 2013, Sergeant Detective Marc Sullivan showed still photographs of the clothing and accessories worn by Hernandez as seen in the video footage from July 16, 2012 to Massachusetts State Police detectives who conducted previous searches of this residence. A State Police detective stated that he believed he observed a hat and rosary beads consistent with that worn by Hernandez in the still photographs.

On June 28, 2013, this affiant applied for, and was issued, a warrant to conduct a search of 22 Ronald C. Meyer Drive, North Attleboro, MA, to locate and seize the above-described clothing and accessories. That search was conducted on the same date, but did not result in the recovery of the clothing and accessories. Based upon the failure to locate those items, on June 28, 2013, Bristol (CT) Police applied for, and were issued, a warrant to seize and search the bag of clothing labeled as belonging to Aaron Hernandez at 114 Lake Avenue in Bristol, Connecticut. That search did not result in the recovery of the clothing or accessories.



This affiant believes there is probable cause to believe that the clothing and accessories could be located in the 2006 Toyota 4 Runner silver in color with Rhode Island plate 635035, VIN-JTEBU17R768052996 belonging to Jana Leasing and Rental Corp of 415 Taunton Avenue, E. Providence, RI 02914.

Pursuant to a Connecticut-issued search warrant, On June 28, 2013, Boston Police responded to 114 Lake Avenue in Bristol, Connecticut, and took custody of the 2006 Toyota 4 Runner silver in color with Rhode Island plate 635035, VIN-JTEBU17R768052996 belonging to Jana Leasing and Rental Corp of 415 Taunton Avenue, E. Providence, RI 02914. This vehicle is currently secured in a motor vehicle bay at Boston Police Headquarters at One Schroeder Plaza in Boston. There is probable cause to believe that this vehicle was used in the July 16, 2012 double homicide and may contain evidence relative to the investigation into the murder of Daniel Abreu and Safiro Furtado. In my training and experience I am aware that people leave latent print evidence from coming into contact with surfaces they touch. It is also my experience that people leave personal papers and or items in their own motor vehicles or motor vehicles they ride in. It is my experience and that of Criminalist IV Kevin Kosiorek of the Boston Police Crime Lab that gunshot residue may still exist in the vehicle since there is reason to believe that the vehicle has remained untouched and stored in an enclosed garage for close to one year. I am therefore requesting permission from the court to search the interior and exterior of the vehicle, any locked or unlocked containers, and seize any latent print evidence found, documents or any paper work in the name of Aaron Hernandez, clothing and accessories described herein and gunshot residue.

I am requesting the authority to have specially trained sworn members of the Boston Police Department and civilian members of the Boston Police Forensic Group participate in the processing of the vehicle, and to take photographic and or video representations of the items seized and any evidence found.

Additionally, I am requesting the authority to operate the vehicle in the area(s) where it was captured on surveillance video on July 16, 2012, for comparison purposes.
